Vicar's Thoughts

Where were you forty years ago today (July 20th 1981)?

Were you sat in front of the TV or did you have ears within hearing of a radio tuned to Radio Four long wave or did the event pass unnoticed?

For those too young to have been born then, or who aren't followers of national sporting triumphs, this was the Headingley Test Match where England, looking certain to lose to the Australians having followed on, were struggling at 135 for 7. Ian Botham and Graham Dilley threw caution to the wind and in an avalanche of attacking shots generated a lead over Australia of 140 runs. A lead which was thought to be too small but which enabled, the next morning, an aging Bob Willis with eight of the ten wickets to spearhead an improbable England victory.

So -where were you? I remember clearly, even though it was summer, having a Church Youth football match that afternoon and missing Botham and Dilley's heroics. For England it was victory achieved in the face of almost certain defeat, for Australia it was defeat clutched from the jaws of certain victory.

Whether an event is a victory or defeat always depends on which side we are on.

However, in the case of a pandemic there are no 'sides' and as we move forward into a new phase the language of *defeat* and *victory* seems more and more inappropriate. However, there are many people whose labours have been heroic - and rather like Botham and Dilley's exploits were for me, they may go unnoticed. In the absence of Highlight re-runs on TV for them let us in our prayers, in our actions and in our priorities, identify the heroes we know, let us share their stories and let us thank them whenever, however and as often as we can.

We could say that in the Cricket, if all the England players had done their bit, the heroics wouldn't have been needed. The Australians could also say that if they hadn't lost focus when so far in front, the result would have been very different. Perhaps as we enter this new phase these are two lessons which it is good to remember: everyone doing their bit and everyone keeping focused is as vital now as it ever was. Taking the eye off the ball never ends well.

We would like it if everyone continued to give everyone else plenty of space.

We would like it if people didn't expect to give or get a handshake or a hug.

Perhaps we should expect the storm to run on a little longer yet before we get to the rainbow. We need to ride it out together. It is possible some of the ways we do things in church will change again. We will do everything we can to help to keep you safe and well informed.

Golden Memories



Churchyard and Dogs

There has recently been a growing problem of dog fouling in the churchyard and unbelievably on graves and memorial tablets. It is deeply upsetting that an elderly widow should find dog mess on her husband's memorial stone. Imagine how you would feel if it was your husband, wife or mum's memorial stone. Like with many things it will be argued that it is the few irresponsible dog owners who

Like with many things it will be argued that it is the few irresponsible dog owners who spoil it for the many careful owners. However the churchyard is not a dog toilet or

even an exercise yard - it's a consecrated place where those who are loved and mourned are laid to rest. It is good that dog walkers have a cool space to walk through with their animals but those who let dogs off the lead, or bring them into the churchyard primarily for their ablutions, are failing to respect what a churchyard is for, which is why many churchyards and Civic Cemeteries exclude dogs other than assistance dogs.

To all the careful dog owners, please continue to act with care. There are only two ways dog mess ends up on on the paths, by the door, or on a memorial: either the dog is on a lead and the owner stands there, watches and doesn't clean it up or the dog is not on a lead. Either way, the dog owner is irresponsible and such people's behaviour needs to be challenged.

It would be very sad if, because of the behaviour of a few, we have to ban all dogs as the Parish Council have done with Parrot's Field or like many churchyards and cemeteries, restrict access to assistance dogs only.

Worship Guidelines

What will it be like if I come to church now the *regulations* have been replaced by *quidelines*?

The Services are colour coded and the difference between the Services is now greater than it was. At every service those welcoming on the door will be masked, track and trace will be in operation and we will increase ventilation by opening additional doors where and when we can.

At **Green Services**: Social distancing will be maintained and the expectation is that with the occasional exception everyone will wear masks throughout the service, there will be no singing, either by the congregation, choir or music group.

At **Orange Services**: Social distancing and mask wearing will be required by those sitting in the South side of the Church (the pulpit side). There will be singing led by choir or music group and the congregation are welcome to join in. Those wishing to sing can do so without masks but need to be seated on the the North side of the main aisle. At CoRe masks will be worn throughout the Service including when singing.

At **Red Services** there is no guarantee of space for social distancing or mask wearing. There will be singing lead by the music group. Those wishing to do so may wear masks.
